

Campus History

The story of Bulacan Agricultural State College, a product of decades of educational and sociopolitical metamorphoses, is humble and remarkable. It is a 60-year old state-funded institution of learning situated in Brgy. Pinaod, San Ildefonso, Bulacan.

Established in 1952, the Institution started as the Plaridel Community Agricultural High School (PCAHS) located in Brgy. Bintog, Plaridel, Bulacan. Soon after, PCAHS was renamed Bulacan Provincial Agricultural High School (BPAHS) having just about 100 students. A growth in the student population occurred as students arrived not just from local communities but from other municipalities in the province as well. On 20 June 1953, its name was again changed to Bulacan National Agricultural High School (BNAHS) by virtue of Republic Act 948.

On 8 June 1955, then Pres. Ramon DF. Magsaysay signed Proclamation 163 reserving around 192.5 hectares of the Buenavista Estate for BNAHS. By virtue of Republic Act 2416, BNAHS was converted to Bulacan National Agricultural School (BuNAS) on 21 June 1959.

In 1960, the two-year Associate in Agriculture program became part of the curricular offerings of BuNAS; the first tertiary education program offered in the school which eventually led to the offering of the Bachelor of Science in Agriculture degree with majors in Agronomy and Animal Husbandry.

Cognizant of the prevalent agriculture education and training needs of Bulakeños at the time, Hon. Ricardo C. Silverio, then Representative of the 3rd District of Bulacan, authored House Bill No. 2389 which proposed for an expanded educational program for BuNAS. With the bilateral approval of both Houses, then Pres. Fidel V. Ramos signed Republic Act 8548 officially converting BuNAS into a chartered state college known as the Bulacan National Agricultural State College (BNASC) on 24 February 1998. Over time, its name was changed to Bulacan Agricultural State College (BASC) by virtue of Republic Act 9249 signed by Former President Gloria M. Arroyo on 19 February 2004.

Situated between the country's capital Metro Manila and the Province of Nueva Ecija, it opened its doors in 1952 and 60 years later, it continues to be devoted to discovering answers to the profound challenges of this generation and training students for leadership in today's multifaceted world. Furthermore, BASC has grown to be a regional leader in higher education and remains to be recognized for offering excellent agricultural education, interdisciplinary partnerships and innovative research programs.

The College still supports competent collaborators from different backgrounds to work together with the Administration in the direction of feasible targets. It advocates alliance and modernization across conventional hindrances of education, generating exceptional individuals who pass on their mark to the world. Most of all, BASC continues to uphold its pledge to students, viable research and education.

Like every distinguished education institution, BASC equally pondered and operated upon the bigger world. Its groundwork later became potent and creative. Personnel, students and alumni, partners and stakeholders, and allies have united for this grand educational endeavor. BASC would not be BASC without their dreams, service and allegiance.

Now, its educational calling is to help students by coaching them with leadership and problem-solving proficiency and principles of quality, moral conduct, responsibility to humanity and faithfulness to their potential jobs. Everything is being done to train students for sensible global citizenship and leadership by combining sustainability, public responsibility and esteem for varied outlooks all throughout their curriculum while they acquire deep professional competence.

At present, the College has two satellite campuses on top of the main campus. One is located in in Brgy. Sapang Bulak, Doña Remedios Trinidad, Bulacan. Aptly called the BASC-DRT Campus, it was established in 2005. established in 2011, the other campus is located in Balagtas, Bulacan in consortium with Balagtas Technical-Vocational School.

At BASC, we believe that every student, staff and client brings a unique aspiration. All are welcomed and encouraged to carry out accomplishments they feel can play a part to self, community, country and international progress.



From the President

We all need long-term goals to help us outdo the short-term obstacles.

In light of the continuous progress and consistent realization of the Bulacan Agricultural State College's management and educational agenda, we are without adversaries through the process. The College is a microcosm of society and at the same time it mirrors the endeavors each and every one of us faces in life. And life as we know it, no matter where, how and why we live it, is always spiked with obstacles.

Every facility that is built, every building, every equipment and capital outlay the College had produced for the benefits of its members wasn't established and accrued in an easy and quick manner. The College along with its committed, responsible and highly efficient members invested time, intelligence and effort to achieve the condition of the College as it is now.

Each of us contributed greatly at this extent. Starting with instruction, the percentage of the College's faculty members who had completed their Ph.D. and Ed.D. degrees remarkably increased compared last year. Last AY 2014-2015, the College totaled eighty eight (88) permanent faculty members with either master's or doctor of philosophy degrees. But this AY 2015-16 the College now have ninety four (94) faculty members who earned master's and doctor of philosophy degrees.

The growth of enrolment which has been a trend for the past several years truly indicates that more families are upholding the importance of education. The 14.82 percent increase is not just a posted figure. For us, it means that parents are making efforts to send their children to College and they choose Bulacan Agricultural State College because we are staying true to our mission of becoming an outstanding higher education institution in the country with its provision on affordable and excellent education.

Results of the licensure exams for BEEd, BSEd and BSA and BSABEn this year are all favorable as we surpassed the national passing rate. It is not news to everyone that in the previous years we struggled to meet the passing rates of these licensure exams but through collaborative efforts and continuous improvement of our instructions and unending capacity enhancements for our faculty, we now could say that the College is reaping the outcome of its hard work and sacrifices to attain its educational goals.

The celebration of SCUFAR III Sports and Cultural Festival was another highlight this academic year because we successfully fostered sportsmanship and camaraderie among faculty members from all over the region notwithstanding the disasters brought about by typhoon Lando last October.

In the sports arena we also did well as we bested seven SUCs in the SCUAA III Olympics. With less number of players than last year, still BASC showcased great improvement in the regional sports competition as it climbed three steps from its 8th place ranking last year. With 16 golds, 4 silvers and 11 bronze, Bulacan Agricultural State College made an overwhelming 5th place (4th runner-up) finish in the SUC III Olympics. To add to this victory was the reclaim of BASC baseball team as they brought the championship and advanced to the Nationals.

The College's undertakings in research, extension and training were nothing but fruitful as we enhance and increase our linkages with both private and public agencies to expand our services and development efforts to support our clienteles. At present we do not just promote and forerun the aerobic rice technology, the College is now delving into the productivity enhancement on Carabao Mango in Region III. Organic Agriculture Validation Project was also established in cooperation with DA-BAR and UPLB. This year, internally-funded researches among BASC faculty members are stimulated and encouraged to uplift the quality and standing of research, extension and training department of the College.

We've also managed to obtain international presentations through researches. Ten papers conducted by faculty members and researchers from RET office represented the College in Brunei Darussalam-Indonesia-Malaysia-Philippines East ASEAN Growth Area (BIMP-EAGA) 2015 Conference. It is quite awe-inspiring to know that few years back, the College is lagging behind in the field of research but in the past couple of years, BASC is racing achievements in agricultural and technological research.

What could be a tough feat for me this year as a president must be the chairmanship of DC-SUC III CIRPS.

All these accomplishments were not completed and reached without trials, difficulties and obstacles. The College had taken a long-term view to achieve it one by one. All of our goals and missions didn't succeed and met without setbacks.

There are failures at times but we always get up, brushed off the dirt and regain our focus because reaching the summit is still our goal. Gearing towards academic excellence with global competencies and standards is our long-term goal. No more. No less.

At this point I would like to say that our great accomplishments can only be addressed and credited to our strong sense of teamwork. And as I always say, the College is very fortunate because its most important asset – its people – has always been compassionate in serving our students and achieving our goals. Having said this, I am extending my sincerest gratitude to all of us who have labored very diligently to surpass short-term obstacles just so we continue triumphing our long-term goals.

In the coming days we shall continue to strive hard, even harder. These powerful long-term goals will certainly help us cut through our deterrents and make us better decision makers and team players in order to achieve our best desired outcomes – relevance and excellence.


The seminar aimed to ensure that Higher Educations Institutions (HEIs) have strong ability to compete through quality programs and to be efficient and effective through quality systems.



BASC to offer Rice Machinery Operations NC II

A Certificate of TVET Program Registration in pursuant to Republic Act No. 7796 creating TESDA was granted to BASC on May 10, 2016 to offer a program in Rice Machinery Operations NC II. The program covers basic, common and core competencies on operating rice machinery and equipment as well as the application of safety measure in farm operations. This training program is open to farmers and students and will be conducted and implemented at Bulacan Agricultural State College during the AY 2016-2017. Trainees are required to complete 232 hours of training under Engr. Joselito D. Tucit, a BASC-IEAT faculty. The team targets to produce 50 graduates within the one-year program.

The Office of the Academic, Cultural and Sports Affairs (ACSA) organized and participated in multitude of events this academic year 2015 to 2016. We experienced another year of unbounded commitment and achievements despite some predicaments we managed to resolve. On the other hand, five graduates from the Institute of Engineering and Applied Technology brought pride as they marked a 62.50% institutional passing rate surpassing the 40.43% national passing percentage.

For the Licensure Examination for Teachers held last September 2015, the college produced 78 new licensed teachers, 44 for secondary education and 34 for elementary education. The first time-takers for secondary education acquired a 67.92% institutional passing percentage which is above the national passing rate of 41.75%, while the Bachelor of Elementary Education first timers marked a 48.44% passing rate against the 31.36% national passing percentage.

We also held different activities conducted by all the institutes in the college throughout the academic year for the purpose of informing and making the students as well as our faculty updated with the progress in their respective courses and teaching fields. We are not going to stop in enriching the minds and competencies of our students and faculty. This is our mission we fulfill every year.

Increase in the enrolment for Academic Year 2015-2016

The Bulacan Agricultural State College achieved a significant increase of 14.82% or equivalent to 4,734 on student enrolment for first semester A.Y. 2015-2016. The figure covers enrollees from the three campuses as shown in Table 2.

Bachelor of Animal Science (BAS) had the highest number of enrollees with 1,005, followed by Bachelor of Science in Agriculture (BSA) with 672, and Bachelor of Science in Business Administration (BSBA) with 454.

Among all the college institutes, the Institute of Agriculture had the most number of enrollees which was comprised of more than one-thirds of the total population. This was followed by the Institute of Management (IM) with 1,124, Institute of Education, Arts and Sciences (IEAS) with 646, Institute of Engineering and Applied Technology (IEAT) with 444, and Institute of Graduate Studies (IGS) with 379. The BASC Laboratory High School (LHS) population had decreased from 288 to 163 students.

On the other hand, BASC-DRT Campus marked a 7.22% increase in the enrolment with 193 students compared to 180 students last academic year 2014-2015 while BTVC Campus recorded 109 enrollees.

For the second half of the academic year, a total decrease of 314 or 6.63% student enrollees was recorded as this is the usual trend for the past years. Table 3 shows the comparative enrolment for first and second semesters of AY 2015-2016. However, the Institute of Graduate Studies (IGS) increased its population from 379 of first semester to 418 of second semester.

Table 2. Six-Year Enrolment Projection of BASC




Table 3, Enrolment Data 1st & 2nd Sem 2015-2016



Results of Licensure Examinations

BASC graduates performed well in the 2015 licensure examinations as summarized in Table 2. The Licensure Examination for Agriculturists achieved a 13.33% overall passing rate over the national passing percentage of 31.05% taken last June.

On the other hand, five graduates from the Institute of Engineering and Applied Technology brought pride as they marked a 62.50% institutional passing rate surpassing the 40.43% national passing percentage at Mary Chiles College last August 25-26, 2015.

For the Licensure Examination for Teachers held last September 2015, the college produced 78 new licensed teachers, 44 for secondary education and 34 for elementary education. The first time-takers for secondary education acquired a 67.92% institutional passing percentage which is above the national passing rate of 41.75%, while the Bachelor of Elementary Education first timers marked a 48.44% passing rate against the 31.36% national passing percentage.

Rikken holds forum on gender equality



BASC faculty and administrative staff attended the said seminar-workshop.





IEAS Extension Project: Mentoring on the 3Rs

Last February, IEAS Faculty headed by Dean Ofelia Silverio and Dr. Priscilla San Pedro, VP of Academic, Cultural and Sports Affairs instigated the launched of its adopt-a-school extension project called "Mentoring on the 3Rs (Reading, wRiting, aRithmetic)". The Institute partnered with Palapala Elementary School upon the discretion of the District Supervisor of San Ildefonso South.

This program is generally aimed to improve the performance of the less advantaged pupils on the 3R's (Reading, wRiting, aRithmetic) through mentoring assistance.

Thirty two (32) student volunteers from BEEd 3B and BSEd 3 Major in Physical Science tutored 50 pupils from grade 1 and grade 2 who were assessed by their advisers and considered less advantaged on reading, writing and arithmetic.

First phase of the extension project included pre-test and mentoring assistance on reading every Wednesday and Thursday.

It is expected that once the extension project is accomplished the pupils will have earned 20% increase in post-test results which will be determined by acquiring the average mean of the enrolled pupils in the mentoring program.

IEAS faculties who are also part of this project are Mr. Herbert De Jesus, Mrs. Joselyna Quizon and Ms. Evelyn Alera. While their Palapala Elementary School Counterpart are Mr. Sonny Cruz, the school principal and Mrs. Len Felipe, the school coordinator.

The second phase of the extension project will resume in August.

BASC kick golds in taekwondo



Year 2015 proved to be successful in our aim to continually promote research and development efforts to help our clienteles.

The office of the Research, Extension and Training made a significant contribution in the College's goal for faculty competence and development by approving internally-funded 17 research projects amounting to Php 341,061 and 5 extension projects with a total approved amount of Php 721,515. For the externally-funded research, the office generated a total amount of Php 2,037,792. Moreover, four development projects with a total amount of Php 8,991,810 was generated which was all funded by the Department of Environment and Natural Resources.

Two extension projects entitled "Science and Technology Community-based Farms on Sustainable Mango Production in Pulilan, Bulacan" and "Aerobic Rice R&D Project for Region III" funded by PCAARRD and DA-BAR respectively generated a total amount of Php 3,268,921.

Part of the remarkable success of RET office was the participation of our team to different regional, national and international conferences. Dr. Imelda S.A. Navarro and Dr. Josie A. Valdez presented their papers at the DOST Regional Research Congress held last July 16, 2015 at NEUST, Nueva Ecija. On July 7-11, 2015, Dr. Josefina C.

Mananguit attended and presented a paper in the 1st National Organic Agriculture Scientific Conference held at BengSU, La Trinidad, Benguet.

BASC-RET team also attended the international research forum at the Brunei Darussalam-Indonesia-Malaysia-Philippines East ASEAN Growth Area (BIMP-EAGA) 2015 Conference held at Palawan State University, Puerto Princesa, Palawan last December 14-16, 2015. Presenters on this conference include Dr. Susan C. Santos, Engr. Rhuelyn A. . Ballaran, Dr. Josefina C. Mananguit, and Dr. Josie A. Valdez.

It is noteworthy to recognize the efforts of the College in regional and international presentations. During the 2015 DA-RFO III Research, Development & Extension held last June 10-11, 2015, Dr. Josie A. Valdez was awarded 3rd Best Promising Paper and 3rd Best Poster. He also won as the Best Presenter in his ongoing study. For the development and extension category, Dr. Imelda S.A. Navarro won the Best Poster and Best Presenter awards for completed and on-going studies.

The RET Office also supports the Colleges' commitment in developing and maintaining the skills and knowledge of its faculty, students and the community. 28 trainings were conducted from August 2015 to May 2016.

Tie-up between BASC and Duran Farms

The Department of Agriculture-Agricultural Training Institute (DA-ATI) has tapped BASC to conduct a case study on Daisy Duran of Duran Farms as an accredited extension service provider of DA-ATI. The proposal has been submitted and revised accordingly with a time frame of six months and budget amounting to PhP 149,996.

For the Organic Agriculture (OA) Validation Project, on-station trial of pole sitao was established last March 28. Continuous monitoring of the farms was also undertaken.

Dr. Josefina C. Mananguit, Mrs. Jennifer I. Guevarra and Mrs. Leah V. Indon also attended DOST-PCAARRD's Sipag Fiesta held at PCAARRD, Los Baños, Laguna last March 2. Various products from participating consortia were showcased during the event.



Joining SUCs' Product Fair

The College participated in the SUCs' Product Fair sponsored by CHED in their celebration of 22nd founding anniversary with the theme: Sustaining and Advancing the Gains. The products' fair was participated by different SUCs all over the country and was held at CHED Central Office, Quezon City on May 16-20, 2016. The College exhibited products such as pickled ampalaya, ginger tea, ginger candy, poultry eggs, aerobic variety rice and organically grown products from farmer cooperators.



accomplishments in research, development & technology management office

a. Aerobic Rice Research and Development Project in Region III (DA-BAR)

Weed management and data of weeds per 1sqm was gathered last July 29 at the experimental farm at Sta. Ignacia, Tarlac. Data were analyzed using the total volume of weeds per 1m² of the experimental plot.



b. Unveiling of Diversified and Integrated Rice-Based Farming System proliferates across the Upland Areas of Central Luzon – funded by DA-RFO 3

Upscaling of the Diversified and Integrated Rice-Based Farming System in the Region III project was formally launched at the Brgy. Calabuanan, Baler, Aurora last April 08, 2016. The said affair was attended by 53 farmers, agricultural technicians and SUCs personnel. Prior to the launching of the project, a Palayamanan model farm has to be established in the area of the farmer cooperator, with 12 initially identified farmer members. The said project was the second to be launched for the seven targeted provinces in Region III.

In Magalang, Pampanga, the project had released the first cycle of loan for the 12 farmer-cooperators on May 06, 2016. Farm inputs were also distributed already in the propose sites of Palayamanan model farm at Samal, Bataan and Palauig, Zambales.



c. Assessment of Productivity **Enhancement Measures on** Carabao Mango in Central Luzon (PGAARRD)

Mango trees at the College was pruned last July 29. The project was completed last August 2015. Mr. RaelTajada, IA faculty member and project staff, presented the paper entitled Assessment of Productivity Enhancement Measures on Carabao Mango in Bulacan during the PAA International Conference held on last May 18-2 0, 2016 at Clark Field, Pampanga.



d. Organic Agriculture (OA) Validation Project (UPLB)



Conduct of visitation and monitoring of farmers (conventional and organic) were undertaken last July 8 at the farm of Mr. Narciso Sevilla, conventional farmer cooperator for pole sitao and rice in Bubulong Malaki, San Ildefonso, Bulacan. A wet season trial for rice was established at the College starting June 15 with rice transplanted by July 6. Pole sitao was also planted on June 5.

e. Assessment of and Response to the Needs of Women Faculty and Administrative Staff in BASC (BASC-GAD)

This study identified the needs of women faculty which include the need to feel secure in the workplace, health and wellness, love and belongingness and good working relationship with their co-workers.

An intervention program was formulated which involved a series of activities including team building, workshop on confidence building, socialization activities culminating with a Seminar on Improving Communication and Leadership Skills of Women Faculty and Staff. The study was completed last December 2015.



Groupings per component were also finalized. A meeting and monitoring of the project status was also held last June 30, 2015. The establishment of learning center was already done through the Bayanihan system and the rice farmers had already prepared their land. Mushroom production was also already stable.

2. Productivity Enhancement of Selected Mango **Orchards in Pulilan, Bulacan (PCAARRD)**



Training for Mango Jam Processing was held last May 27-28 and June 1 at Tenejero, Pulian, Bulacan. This was joined by farmers, housewives and BASC faculty and students.

3. Science and Community-Based Farm (STCBF) on Sustainable Mango Production in Pulilan, Bulacan

The proposed project entitled: Science and Community-Based Farm (STCBF) on Sustainable Mango Production in Pulilan, Bulacan which was presented by Engr. Rhuelyn Ballaran, was approved by the Philippine Council for Agriculture, Aquatic and Natural Resources Research and Development (PCAARRD) during its 10th regular meeting held on October 19, 2015 at the CB Perez, PCAARRD Headquarter, Los Banos, Laguna. The said project has an approved budget of Php 2,533,900.00 with duration period of two year commencing within three months after the receipts of fund.



4. Trainings on Aerobic Rice Technology

Another milestone for BASC-RET transpired when the DA-Municipal Agriculture Office of Camiling, Tarlac requested for training on Aerobic Rice Technology last April 18, 2016 at the Municipal office of Camiling, Tarlac. The said training was attended by 60 farmers from the different barangays of Camiling where the resource speaker was Dr. Josie A. Valdez, the project leader of Aerobic Rice Research and Development project.

This was followed by another Aerobic Rice technology training conducted last May 04, 2016 at Brgy. Masalipit, San Miguel, Bulacan. The said training was upon the request of the President of the Bulacan Upland Farmers Association through the Municipal Agriculture Office of San Miguel and DRT. It was attended by 125 farmers from the different municipalities of Bulacan where Dr. Josie A. Valdez was the resource person.

5. MOA signing for better delivery of BASC extension services

A formal launching and MOA signing of the Regional Agriculture and Fisheries Extension Network (RAFEN) was held at DA-Regional Office, City of San Fernando, Pampanga on May 18, 2016. Dr. Gerardo I. Mendoza, together with other SUCs presidents, head of agencies and private sectors signed in the MOA where Mrs. Jennifer I. Guevarra signed as witness. The said activity was through the initiative of DA-ATI RTC III which aimed to establish partnership mechanism to harmonize the delivery extension services.

The Office of Administration, Finance, Planning and Business Affairs takes pride in presenting to you a glimpse of another productive and successful year. Through the years, the AFPBA Office continuously marks significant contributions in the growth of BASC.

For four years, BASC was among the first batch of SUC's in the country to qualify for the Performance-Based Bonus (PBB) grant. Accomplishing the physical targets was a tedious work which involved close monitoring and evaluation of each unit. However,

Moreover, the College was able to generate Php 16.988M from the Capital Outlay (CO) from which the construction of Arts and Science Building, Multi-Purpose Building, and purchase of agriculture laboratory equipment were completed. accomplishments based on physical targets for F.Y. 2015

BASC continuously takes pride in having been among the first batch to qualify for the Performance-Based Bonus grant for pay out until February 29, 2016.

Among the four delivering units, the Higher Education Services Unit ranked first with a mean of 179.24% accomplishment based on the physical targets. Research, Extension and Training Unit ranked second with 153.96% rate of physical accomplishments followed by Support to Operations (STO) with 102.65% rate and General Administrations and Support Services (GASS) Unit with 101.03% rate physical accomplishments. A total bonus of Php 1,610,700 was released for 122 faculty and staff who equally contributed for the achievement of physical targets of the college. F.Y. 2015 BUDGET

The total annual budgetary allocation of the College for FY 2015 showed a significant increase. As compared to last year's budget, General Appropriation Act (GAA) actual released budget for FY 2014. GAA had allocated a budget of PhP 119,163,000 this year compared to PhP 102,008,000 last year, a recorded increase of 14.40%. On the other hand, SUC income also increased by 15.98% this year. From PhP 30,586,000 to PhP 36,404,000 in FY 2015. Both funds totaled Php 155,567,000, which is 14.76% higher than last year's Php 132,594,000. The top three services which benefited largely from these funds are Higher Education Services, General Admin and Support, and Auxillary Services.




Figure 3. Faculty profile based on tenure of service (unfilled items not included)




Figure 4. Faculty profile based on academic ranks (unfilled items not included)




Figure 5. Educational Attainment of BASC Faculty (unfilled items not included)
