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HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The Bulacan Agricultural State College was established through Republic Act 8548 by then President Fidel V. Ramos on February 24, 1998, converting Bulacan National Agricultural School. The law mandated the College to establish an effective and efficient institution of higher learning that will provide better professional and technical training in agriculture and allied disciplines and in the conduct of agricultural researches and scientific studies. Later, through the collaborative effort of BASC and the local government of Dona Remedios Trinidad, satellite extension unit was added to the College in 2005 as Institute of Agroforestry and Environmental Studies.

The Bulacan Agricultural State College is strategically located in the northern part of the Province of Bulacan, Central Luzon region. Coincidentally, the BASC main and College of Agriculture campuses are situated along the province's producer of rice and vegetable municipalities.

Twenty-five years after its conversion as state college, the BASC has become a credible Higher Education Institution (HEI). In 2019 it was awarded by the Commission on Higher Education, one of the 55 out of 106 State Universities and Colleges in the country with Level III status based on CMO No. 09, s. 2019. In May 29, 2022, by virtue of Republic Act 11783, BASC was converted into Bulacan State Agricultural University and is now in the process of compliance on CHED's requirement on universityhood as contained in Sec. 20 of the said law.

In 2024, it maintains the ISO: 9001-2015 certification on administration, instruction, research and extension. In February, 2025, BASC has achieved three stars rating by Quacquarelli Symonds (QS), the world's largest global higher education network.

With its educational leadership, and pioneering roles in research, along with the strategic location of its campuses in the region, the College has been successfully achieving its vision, mission, goals and objectives. Today, BASC stands as a credible partner of development in the country with its motto "Shaping Minds, Transforming Lives" and with the dedicated commitment of its faculty, support staff, students and other stakeholders, the future will see the College grow to even greater heights.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY





Outcome Indicators:

1. Percentage of first-time licensure exam-takers that pass the licensure exams

BASC's unwavering commitment to academic excellence is demonstrated through initiatives such as Project 3R (in-house reviews for licensure exam-related courses), customized internal assessments, and a strong system of academic support. These efforts have significantly improved licensure exam passing rates and have effectively prepared students to succeed in their respective fields.

In recognition of its performance, BASC was ranked **6th among the top ten performing schools** in the Licensure Examination for Teachers. This achievement provides valuable insights that can guide further improvements in curriculum design, teacher education programs, and professional development strategies, all aimed at enhancing the quality of instruction and teacher competence nationwide.

Moreover, the college's excellence was further affirmed when one of its graduates secured **3rd place** in the **Licensure Examination for Food Technologists** held in August 2024. This outstanding performance reflects the high standard of education and training BASC provides, particularly in specialized fields like food technology, and showcases the institution's role in producing highly capable professionals.

With **20% of the promotion criteria** across all academic ranks now dedicated to extension work, faculty members have been more motivated to initiate, design, and actively participate in community-based projects. This policy has not only encouraged broader faculty engagement but has also enriched the quality and reach of BASC's extension services—further reinforcing the institution's commitment to inclusive community empowerment and sustainable development.

With a target of 88% and an actual rating of 95.61% (3,655 out of 3,823 beneficiaries), BASC has significantly exceeded expectations in delivering high-quality and relevant training and advisory services. This outstanding result reflects the institution's commitment to providing responsive, needs-based extension programs that are both impactful and well-received by its stakeholders. The high satisfaction rate underscores the effectiveness of BASC's approach to community engagement and its dedication to continuous improvement in service delivery. It also reinforces the institution's role as a trusted partner in advancing inclusive, knowledge-driven development at the grassroots level.
